FISHING DERBY ANOTHER NB CIVITAN SUCCESS



With the Civitan International Research Center, Civitans have a centralized outlet for their fundraising efforts around the world. The Center has made monumental breakthroughs in medical research, and incorporated the Civitan-Sparks Clinics (previously the Sparks Center for Learning and Developmental Disorders), a clinical diagnosis and treatment center located in Birmingham, Alabama.

While membership in North America experienced a decline, Civitan gained a massive expansion around the world. Clubs were chartered in Asia, Europe and Africa. By the end of 2009, the Civitan family of countries included a total of 30 nations.

In 2010, the organization unveiled a new club category targeted at young adults. They were called Young Professionals or YP Civitan Clubs.

2012 marked the 25th anniversary of the UAB Civitan International Research Center. In 2016, the Center unveiled the Civitan International Neuroimaging Laboratory, through which scientists will conduct even more advanced research into neurological disorders.

We are currently in Civitan's centennial year – celebrating our 100th birthday. In preparations for this, a capital campaign known as the Restoration Fund was launched to fund repairs and refurbish the International Headquarters building. These repairs are now completed in time for the Centennial International Convention coming up this month at the end of June. Those of us in the Club who have signed up to go there are looking forward to the convention and a tour of the facility.

There are now Civitan clubs in 47 countries around the world, all of whom are looking forward to the next century of service.

The North Carolina District East Spring meeting was held at the Boys and Girls Homes at Lake Waccamaw on April 29th. Six of our club members attended – President Dev Lippitt, President-elect Jan Snyder, Linda Johnson, Mitch Harriet, Kris Rudzik and Bill Snyder. They were addressed and informed by a variety of presenters of what's going on in our District.

Gary Faircloth, President and CEO of the Boys and Girls Homes, spoke about the homes and their work with unwanted and abused children. "Beauty is a silent teacher," Faircloth said. "Great effort is made to maintain a place of beauty here for our children." He went on to give a brief summary of the history of the Homes. The first Civitan cottage was opened in 1958.

April is Child Abuse Awareness month. He stated, "It should not hurt to be a child." Proudly, Gary stated that this year, there will be 12 graduates in 2017 – 7 will be going on to college. All in all, they have 171 foster homes that work with 190 children in foster care. Our Club monetarily supports the Boys and Girls Homes and we are thrilled with their success. Gary closed his talk by saying, "Thank you Civitans. Thank you for hearing the call of children!"

In some other news from the spring meeting:

Velvet Leggett, Junior Civitan Chair announced that the Junior Civitan Convention will also be in Birmingham, Alabama at the same time as the International Civitan Convention. A North Carolina District East scholarship was awarded to Darby from New Bern High School – yeah team!

North Carolina District East for 2015-16 was the Quality Achievement District again for the fourth year.

For 2015-16, our Club won patches for our banner as an Honor Club, Fruitcake Sales (27.5% increase in sales), and Civitan at the Helm.

The importance of social media as a big part of Civitan's future was discussed.

Joe Parker, Past International President closed the meeting with a discussion of the future of Civitan. He declared, "To reach Quality Achievement, we need new clubs, as well as new members. MANY HANDS PROVIDE COMPASSIONATE CARE

One of the charities that our Club supports is Merci Clinic located in New Bern. It is a non-profit community clinic, staffed primarily by volunteers, which provides free health care services for adults of Craven, Pamlico and Jones counties who are of limited income without medical or dental insur-

ance. Beth Cooper, new Executive Director of Merci, addressed our group on Thursday, May 11th at our evening meeting at Famous restaurant.

Merci Clinic, like many other charities, is having trouble keeping afloat due to lack of

funding and donations. They are working on different fundraising projects so they may get to the point of accepting new patients. It costs over \$600 per year just for one patient and they have to turn many patients away for their monetary shortfall. This year, we donated \$800 from our Charity Budget and \$100 each in memory of our deceased members, Russ Laustsen and Ray Wood.
