## **FEED CRAVEN**

Feed Craven is a non-profit food pantry serving Eastern North Carolina. It operates separately from, but in partnership with, The Church at New Bern. Their **Community Outreach Coordinator, Tamara Carroll,** addressed our meeting on August 24<sup>th</sup>. Ms. Carroll has been an entrepreneur for over forty years and has been key to getting the word out about Feed Craven. She tries to develop relationships and conveys its financial needs to the community. Her experience in networking and fundraising, as well as her passion to assist people in need, helps Feed Craven pursue its vital humanitarian mission.

Tamara said, "Approximately 13,770 people in Craven County live in households without proper nutritionally, healthy food, a staggering 14% of the county's population. A worse statistic is that 21% of children under 18 are without proper food. With the partnership of the Food Bank and others supporting our mission, approximately five hundred people are helped by Feed Craven each month. We try our best to provide four healthy meals over a two-week period for our guests. Of note, Feed Craven operates solely on funds brought in from outside sources. Unfortunately, our funding is almost always insufficient."

Feed Craven offers a combination of food provided by The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) and food/products purchased or donated at discount rates from various food distribution centers. The foods that are offered include fruits, vegetables, bottled water, frozen meat, cereal, and canned goods. Feed Craven also strives to maintain stock for Emergency Disaster Relief such as cleaning supplies, water, Meals Ready to Eat (MRE). All food/products are free to the registered guests. They also like to offer Christmas toys and specials meals at the holiday season that are fully funded by Feed Craven Food Pantry Volunteers and Sponsors.

Distributions occur every second and fourth Friday of each month. On a typical Feed Craven Food distribution event, they serve an average of 80-120 families – over 350 people altogether. many being children. Each family that registers is partnered with a volunteer who assists the guests through the process. Before each guest leaves, the volunteer helps load the groceries, offers encouragement, prayer, and friendship.

Feed Craven operates with a team of about 25 volunteers, aged 16 to late 70s. Their goal is to partner with local organizations in New Bern for food drives and monthly support or even a one-time gift to help them help more families. As we begin to formulate our next year's Charity Budget, this organization will be given serious consideration for funding. ### AN ENVIRONMENT OF CARE

Ray Cockrell, Chief Mission Officer of the Boys and Girls Homes at Lake Waccamaw, was our guest speaker on August 11<sup>th</sup> along with 2 student residents and a Teaching Parent of Lake Cabin 3. Ray has held this position for nearly three years. Before that, he was the Vice President for Development and Planned Giving Officer for over 15 years. He was also an Admissions Professional at his alma mater, UNC-Wilmington, for 16 years. He holds both a master's degree in educational administration and a bachelor's in communication studies.


Boys and Girls Homes of NC is dedicated to meeting the physical, emotional, mental, behavioral, social, educational, and spiritual needs of children, youth, and families in distress or at-risk. Their vision is to provide an environment of care that promotes health, healing and hope among children, youth and families who enter their continuum of care.

Ray started the presentation by telling us about a typical summer day for the students when they are not in school. They start in their cabins with a family breakfast and then they disperse to different activities which include chores and then recreational activities which could include sports, body building, landmark visitations, swimming and the like. During the school year, they attend the Thomas Academy on campus – a charter school.

We then heard from two students – Bon, an 18-year-old girl and Ramaj, a 16-year-old boy. They spoke about their typical daily life in their respective cabins. Several key components of living at the Homes are to respect each other, emphasize with others, communicate effectively with others and be responsible for their own actions and behavior. A rewards plan is enacted for all positive behavior. For some students, this may be the only stable home life that they have ever experienced. Both youngsters were polite and well-spoken. The Teaching Parent who attended, Jacinda, has worked in the cabin for unwed mothers and their children for five years. Her goal is to assist the girls in becoming responsible and loving mothers while helping them to finish or further their education. One of the cabins that is supported by Civitan Clubs in all North Carolina is a home with this responsibility.

Ray was presented with a check for \$2500 from our Club. He was very grateful, and he said he may come to our Installation Dinner. He may even come to the meeting with something special for some of our members, but you'll have to attend the Dinner to find out what that is!

After the meeting, Eileen Buscemi spoke with Ray about a graduate of the Boys and Girls Homes who was doing some outside property work at her house. Chuck proudly told her about how "the Homes" changed his life. This made Ray very happy...another success story and another youngster who survived a harrowing childhood and became a productive adult. That is the Homes' goal and it's always rewarding to hear success stories!
