While our price increase (from \$20 to \$23) only partially covered the \$1.10 increase in the pork price since last Fall, we had over \$200 in donations that made up the difference. **The bottom line is that we cleared over \$1,700.**

CC PRE-K AND FAMILY LITERACY DONATIONS



By now, most of you can write or recite this article by heart, as we have been making this collection for about ten years, but we do have some recent members who may not be aware of what we are collecting and for whom we are collecting. For some, this is a refresher...for others, an education.

Those enrolled in the Craven County Pre-School and Family Literacy Program (the children we see at Santa Land) must qualify for the program by being physical or mentally disabled or delayed development, limited in English proficiency and economically disadvantaged. We will be assisting these children and families by collecting the following at our July 27th and August 11th meetings.

Spiral notebooks for the adults in the Family Literacy part of this program. They are in stores now and some are as low as 35 cents each – Walmart, Staples, Roses & others. **Folders with pockets** for the children to keep their work in or for notes to go home to parents. Walmart had them for 20 cents each last year.

Children's book bags in sizes 14 to 15 inches for 3- to 5-year-olds. No need to buy any fancy bags with Disney or other designer brand names – they become expensive. We have found a place online where we can order 24 backpacks in bulk and the backpacks will then cost about \$3.00. Most store backpacks are \$5.00 or more. If you would like to contribute money toward this purchase, you may make a check out to New Bern Civitan Club for whatever amount you want and give it to either Judy Lopez, Maureen Comer or Van Rice indicating what you want it to purchase. OR – you may buy your own and bring it to either meeting. If you cannot make either meeting, Judy Lopez or Maureen Comer will plan to pick it up from you.

Lap Blankets or Beach Towels for the children's nap times. After lunch, the children lay on floor mats and are covered by these donations. Each child has his/her own for sanitary reasons. We have recently seen lap blankets in Rose's for \$1.99 each. If you go on Wednesday, Seniors get 10% off. Sadly, many of the children's families in this program cannot even afford that.

You know the prices on these items continue to go up every year so buying these supplies has become even more of a hardship to the families. We can assure you that ALL your donations go to deserving kids and families. And, just so you know, the "Stuff the Bus" initiative for Craven County Schools does not cover this Pre-School Program as it is intended for Grades K-12, not for Pre-K.

As always, if you do not want to shop, Judy Lopez or Maureen Comer will shop for you with your donation. Thank you for your generosity.

Something to be proud of: Last summer, we donated for the kids 144 lap blankets, 186 backpacks, 320 folders and 55 spiral notebooks. WOW!

Susan Husson, Executive Director of the Interfaith Refugee Ministry in New Bern, and a member of our Club, spoke at our meeting on June 14.



RCS DONATION



Krishanda Jones, Interim Executive Director of Religious Community Services in New Bern attended our meeting on June 14th to update us on new things happening with their facility and programs. Her first comment was to thank our Club for its continuing monetary support, our Shelter "Christmas Party" with gifts and our monthly Shelter dinner project.

Last year, the Shelter provided a total of 14,074 nights of shelter to 180 individuals. This breaks down as follows: the main shelter at 5,840 nights; Veteran's Wing at 1,228 nights, and Family Shelter at 7,006 nights. They are expanding the Shelter facilities into another building where they can accommodate female veterans. This is a work in progress. RCS is committed to breaking the cycle of homelessness and helping individuals and families build stable, fulfilling lives.

RCS stays dedicated to addressing the critical issue of food insecurity in North Carolina. Their Community Kitchen provides healthy and nutritious meals to those in need 365 days a year. Last year, between the RCS Community Kitchen, Food Pantry and Operation Outpost programs, they supplied 113,520 servings of food to the community. This has made a real impact for many in New Bern. Also, last year, their Food Pantry filled a total of 33,746 emergency food orders.

Ms. Jones reminded our group of their upcoming Gala on August 24. More details are on their website. So, with this update, we have learned where our Club's donation to them this year might be spent. We are proud of our \$2,500 contribution to RCS and congratulate them for "reaching out in service to others."

He is currently the liaison from the Elks Club of New Bern to the North Carolina Veterans Home in Kinston. She will be reaching out to other members for ideas and aid.

The Home's website says, "It is an honor and a privilege to provide high quality care to our nation's veterans." Doug filled us in with more details. The cards and letters we have been sending have been well received. The residents enjoy getting mail. Some have no visitors as their families and friends are gone. The facility has four wings that can house one hundred vets. One of the wings is a dedicated memory unit. The rooms are of a substantial size with private bathrooms. Each wing has a dedicated recreation room and a dining hall. The Home has five women, but most residents are male.


