## IF WE DON'T GIVE A PERSON A CHANCE, WHAT ARE THEIR CHANCES?



Deborah Kania of "Autismazing" – a local 501C3 organization in New Bern – received a \$500 donation from our Club at our July 12<sup>th</sup> meeting. Its mission is to improve higher education, employment, and entrepreneurial opportunities for young adults 13-30 years of age on the autism spectrum through financial support, programs and other initiatives.

Autism Spectrum Disorder is a medical condition that affects the brain in approximately 3.5 million people in the U.S. While a person may have a normal physical appearance, autism affects behavior. Autism can make it difficult for a person to interact socially.

Autismazing seeks to increase public awareness of the talents and strengths had by autistic youth and adults. It seeks to advocate on behalf of autistic people who may not have ability to do so for themselves. It looks to provide support to autistic people in their pursuit of higher education, careers, or entrepreneurship (in the form of grants). It looks to educate and support autistic adults in pursuing lifelong independence.

More about people on the autism spectrum:

- 34.7% attend college vs. 69.2% of non-autistic peers.
- 53.4% of 21–25-year-olds have worked after HS.
- Only 20% have full-time employment at \$8.10/hr. (and NO benefits).
- 40% who shared their condition to employers received accommodations or help.
- An estimated 70% unemployment rate vs. 5% national average.

Autismazing looks to CHANGE THESE NUMBERS FOR THE BETTER.

#### **REALIZE U 252**



What exactly is Realize U 252? We learned that answer at our meeting on July 25 from its Director, Garret Biss. Mr. Biss is a veteran, an award-winning author, and a leader in the addiction recovery industry. He is a retired Marine Corps Pilot, who has turned personal adversity into advocacy after confronting a post-retirement crisis of anxiety, depression, addiction, and thoughts of suicide.

Garret has charted a transformative path of recovery by emphasizing self-worth and resilience. He is the co-founder of a pioneering recovery residence and creator of Valien Path. Garret leads others toward healing and growth. He blends engineering precision with innovation and military leadership to inspire change and offer practical solutions to complete challenges.

His project Realize U 252 in New Bern is a long-term residential recovery home for men in Craven County. Its mission is to empower individuals to realize their potential for long-term recovery from addiction and substance-use disorders. The facility provides a sober living environment for adult males seeking long-term addiction recovery. Residents benefit from peer support, in-house life skills training, with a connection to areas resourced for job coaching, education, and clinical service through community providers.

Dr. Gabor Nate defines addiction this way: "Addiction is when you can't get enough of what you don't want any more." Typical addiction programs support the addict for merely 30 days. The rate of falling back into addiction is exceedingly high with such a short program. What makes RU 252 sober living unique are the benefits of specialized recovery coaching, propriety in-house curriculum, recovery case management, in-house peer support and the freedom to work or take classes. Residents determine their own length of stay. Minimum preferred length of stay is six months. This kind of program usually has an 86% success rate as compared to a 30-day program at 36%.

Spread the word in Craven County that such a program exists in our community. If you want to know more, their website is **RealizeU252.org**.

#### THE GIS OF THE CITY OF NEW BERN



We received an informative lecture from the City of New Bern's Geographic Information Manager, Alice Wilson, on July 12<sup>th</sup>. She has been in this position for nearly 24 years. Alice has been involved in local governments in planning and geographic information for over 32 years. She has a BS in Urban and Regional Planning with a minor in Geography from ECU and a Master's degree in GIS Science and Technology from NCSU. Alice is also the local government's representative to the NC Statewide Mapping Advisory Committee (SMAC) and the American Planning Association for NC (APA-NC) for 12 years.

Here are some brief statistics you may not know:

- City of New Bern Population 32,226 (2023 US Census estimates)
- Craven County Population 102,391 (2023 US Census estimates)
- City Size 29.9 square miles
- Number of Streets 184.25 miles
- Sidewalks 46.3 miles
- Bike Paths 11.7 miles

You can learn more about City Development Projects, Storm and Hurricane Preparedness, Resiliency Projects, Commercial Projects, Building Projects, New Housing Growth, Information on the new Stanley White Center, and more.

Here is some hurricane information that was interesting to this writer as both these storms damaged MY home:

- August 2011 Irene 7 feet + surge 400 structures damaged and \$12 million structural damage.
- September 2018 Florence 10 feet + surge >2000 structures damaged/\$100.2 million structural damage including 221 Commercial Buildings \$25 million; 1,724 Homes \$75 million multiple piers/docks and city offices; loss of jobs, sales/inventory, debris cleanup.

Alice was only able to touch the surface on the wealth of information her GIS stats available to us through the city website can give us. You can find out "almost" anything you are looking for. Thanks for this important and valuable service to our community!

## PRE-K SUPPLIES COLLECTIONS CONTINUE TO GROW – 2024

We have one more collection date at our August 9<sup>th</sup> meeting for donations to the Craven County Pre-K and Family Literacy Program for 2024. A new batch of 4-year-olds will start in this program in early September. Before then, directors, teachers, and teaching assistants will visit with the child and his/her family to complete what is needed to start the program.

Many of these families cannot supply "back to school" items for their children and that is how this Club helps. The 15" backpacks help the kids transport books and supplies to and from their homes to the school. The lap blankets are used to cover the children during their half hour nap times – after lunch. The pocketed folders help to send communications from the school to the homes.

Another part of the program involves the parents and guardians who participate in the Family Literacy part of the program. They may be pursuing a GED diploma, looking to learn or improve their English, or asking for help in resume/application forms or job interviewing skills. The spiral notebooks are used in this part of the schedule.

We have made a great start this year through your generosity of items and money. As always, we are grateful for what you have done thus far and what might be donated on August 9<sup>th</sup>.

If you do not want to shop, Judy Lopez and Maureen Comer would be happy to shop for you. If you have items but cannot come to the meeting, let us know and we will pick your items up from you.

### LOOKING BACK AT CHERRY POINT AIRCRAFT HISTORY



Our member, Robert Brock, has been a lifelong resident of eastern North Carolina. He has seen many changes in the area. He is also a student of "history" and in this article, he shares with us some of the history of the US Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point. Read on and learn more about the place where you are living...

Cherry Point was commissioned on May 20, 1942. It was an important and essential part of the base that was created for the aviation purpose of being an Assembly and a Repair Department. Many civilians have been employed in this department and it has been one of the largest employers with a great economic impact on Craven and surrounding counties.

It is interesting to know how this department has grown and has been renamed to reflect its growing and increasing responsibilities over the years.

- The Assembly and Repair Department (A & R) was created in 1943.
- The name was changed to the Overhaul and Repair (O & R) Department in 1945.
- The name was changed to the Naval Air Rework Facility (NARF) in 1969.
- The name was changed to Naval Aviation Depot (NADEP) in 1987.
- The name was changed to Naval Air Depot (NAVAIR) in 2004.
- The name was changed to Fleet Readiness Center East (FRC East) in 2006.

Although the department name changes are well remembered by long-time Craven County residents, those who have become recent "locals" would be unaware of the name changes and increasing responsibilities of Cherry Point aviation.
