Ruth is a lifelong educator and was a teacher for 33 years. She retired in 2011, and that's when her "real" work began. She is the Director of the Kingswood Ministry at Garber Church, where four days per week, eighteen to twenty at-risk students are transported after school for a healthy snack, playtime, devotion, and prayers. They are paired with a church or community volunteer who helps with homework and remedial skills.

Ruth has attended twelve mission trips to Haiti where she has helped in programs for physically or mentally disabled residents. She is co-executive director of Backpack Blessings – a non-profit with the goal of feeding hungry children in Eastern North Carolina.

The program has grown tremendously and is now celebrating their 11th Anniversary, it now services every elementary and middle school in Craven, Pamlico, and Jones counties and serves over 900 children per week. She has expanded this program even further to include a summer food program for families and a holiday program which includes a festive meal for many families. These programs are supported by twenty local churches and civic organizations.

Moreover, Ruth is also a Sunday School Teacher, a member of the Handbells Choir, her church choir, and sings in the "Messiah" and the Craven County Community Choir.

This busy lady finds time for so many community projects that impact children and their families throughout the year. It is an honor to award to Ruth Powers the New Bern Civitan Club Citizen of the Year award.

Thank you, Ruth, for all you do to aid disadvantaged folks in our community.

CLUB RETURNS TO BUSINESS MEETINGS

September 13th's Club meeting was a return to a business meeting where information and updates can be shared with the membership. The Board decided to include one Business meeting per quarter for the 2024-2025 Civitan calendar year. Those meetings will be on January 23, 2025; April 24, 2025; July 24, 2025; and September 12, 2025.

Important announcements and updates will still be included in the monthly newsletter as well as in the weekly updates, but the business meeting reports will be more in-depth, and members will be able to ask questions of the chairpersons of the various committees. Here is a summary of each report:

Van Rice – Treasurer's Report: The Club is in good standing financially. Approximately \$25,000 was donated locally and to International including local scholarships to NBHS students and Craven Community College scholarships.

Van Rice – Ramp Report: Nineteen ramps have been built thus far this year. The CarolinaEast Foundation have recommended many. This is a great community service which is very appreciated by those who might not be able to live at home if not for our wonderful ramp builders.

Betty Todd – Tree Lot: Both Tree lot chairs were out ill, so Betty read a report written by them. The Tree Lot will go back to selling the Friday after Thanksgiving. The moving of the date last year resulted in some leftover trees which were donated. We are hoping that the return to an earlier date will bring us back to a sell out in 2024 over a 3-day period.

Jan Snyder – Veterans Recognition Program: This is a new program just getting started. In January 2025, interested members will be invited to lunch at someone's house and we will be writing notes and cards to Veterans at the Vet Home in Kinston, NC. The cards will not be connected to any special occasion. It will be a "Just Because We Care" writing so those at the home know that there are many in our community who are thinking about them. A visit to the Kinston Home is scheduled for October.

Jim Comer – Santa Land: Again will be held in a trailer at one of the Craven County Schools. This year it will be scheduled after the Tree Lot, and it will be spread out to every other day so our elves will have more time to recover between sessions.

Eileen Buscemi – Operation Keep Warm: This is the project where we gather hats, scarves, gloves, and mittens for the children who come to Santa Land. She reported that we have enough for this year, but we need scarves as we go forward. Scarves don't have to be knitted or crocheted. They can be cut from colorful fleece which is sixty inches wide and forty-five inches long. Donations of this fleece can yield up to twelve scarves per donation. Be looking out for bargain all you bargain hunters!

Maureen Comer – RCS Shelter Christmas Party: Scheduled for December 9th. We prepare a special dinner and have presents for the residents and special presents for the children who may be housed there at Christmas time. Marie and Roy Leonard – Peanut Sales: Will begin at the Farmers Market on November 2nd and will continue every Saturday until Christmas or until sold out. In addition to the salted and chocolate peanuts there will be an additional variety of peanuts. Last year's sales were very successful.

Without Civitan status, we would not be able to keep our charitable 501(c)(3) status, which would mean that we are no longer a charitable organization. Without Civitan recognition as a formal Club, we would not be insured under the umbrella of the organization. This would highly damage the limited protection that our Ramp crew has being under the auspices of an official Club status. All fundraising would have to cease under the name of Civitan. There are many, many more reasons why our Club cannot go on without leadership.

We had a President who stayed on for three terms because no one would step up to take the role. Another former President served a second term because he did not want to see the Club die. Two newer members stepped up to keep the Club running but no one has stepped up to take the President-elect position for the 2024-25 Civitan year so the current president will now take on the President-elect position after serving a year as President. Keep in mind, also, that we have a Vice President position that hasn't been filled for a while, too.

Fellow members, how long can we do this before the Club dies from lack of leadership? If this club ceases to exist, how many of you would consider joining the Tryon Club? I would guess that about 80% of our past presidents were "reluctant leaders." By that, I mean, they did not actively look to be a Club president, but they realized someone had to step up – so they did. Is being Club president difficult? I would say a little bit, but most of it is giving up some time. A good president knows that he/she has a Board of Directors who can help – all he/she must do is either delegate or ask for help. Many reluctant leaders have the talent to be President, but they are hesitant to step out of their comfort zone.

I would ask that every member consider volunteering for these two positions. The Club support will be there for you. If you are like me, I don't want to see a good thing die. And the New Bern Civitan Club dies too soon without your help.
