# SUPPORTING ABUSED CHILDREN



Director and Forensic Interviewer, Casey Hoffman, of the Craven and Pamlico Counties Children's Advocacy Center has a tough job, but a necessary one. She has dedicated the last twelve years of her career to working with children and families. Throughout her career, she has held various positions, including serving as a therapist for high-risk families and children, a social worker with the Department of Social Services, and currently as the Director and Forensic Interviewer at Southmountain Children and Family Services.

Southmountain provides comprehensive care and support for children and families facing the trauma of child abuse. They have eleven different sites in North Carolina including the one in Craven/Pamlico counties. Their aim is to try to ensure that children receive the specialized attention and mental health services they need to heal and thrive. This organization receives referrals from DDS and law enforcement and has a mission to minimize continued trauma to child victims and their non-offending family members resulting from child physical or sexual abuse. A multidisciplinary team (investigating agencies and CAC staff) reviews active cases on at least a bi-weekly basis. In addition to gathering information to prosecute the perpetrator in the case, the team also works to ensure that the victims and their families get assistance with treatments and services as needed. Other services include forensic medical exams, mental health counseling and anything else the child and family members may need.

Casey says, "It's hard to talk about my job to others when I am not working. No one really wants to hear about child abuse. The success of the services in my Agency is hard to measure in terms of quantifiable outcomes. But, to the children and families who have found themselves caught up in the nightmare of child abuse, we are safe, friendly places where the nightmare ends and the road to successful recovery begins."

We thank Casey Hoffman, and her staff at the Children Advocacy Center for what they do to relieve the suffering of children in peril and their families. We can only hope that someday the services of this Agency will no longer be needed!

# **AREA AGENCY ON AGING**

We learned a lot about the Area Agencies on Aging (AAA) from their representatives January Brown and Amanda Young at our meeting on October 11, 2024. The AAAs were established under the Older American Act (OAA) in 1973 to respond to the needs of Americans 60 and over in every local community. By offering a range of options that allow older adults to choose the home and community-based services and living arrangements that suit them best. AAAs make it possible for older adults to "age in place" in their homes and communities.

Their mission is to advocate, plan, develop, and support a comprehensive system of quality services designed to reach and preserve quality of life, health, and independence of older adults, individuals with disabilities and caregivers. Their vision is that older adults and their families will be valued and supported by their community. This Agency's programs are too many to list, but a sampling would be meal programs, Senior Centers, Caregiver Support groups, transportation, technology help, legal aide, health insurance, in-home health care aide, and more.

One of their newer programs is *Project Lifesaver – Bringing Loved Ones Home*. This is a rapid response rescue program for individuals who are at risk of wandering and becoming lost. Participants are fitted with a personalized Project LifeSaver wristband. This wristband is a one-ounce battery run transmitter that omits an automatic tracking signal. When needed, this signal can be tracked by specially trained personnel in the New Bern Police and Fire Departments. Search time can be reduced from hours and days down to minutes. The Project can provide comfort and peace of mind to caregivers without compromising the safety and dignity of their loved one.
